

OCULA Annual General Meeting Reports, 2014

The following reports will be delivered or referred to at the OCULA 2014 Annual General Meeting on January 29th, 2015.

President's Report and Welcome to the OCULA AGM

OCULA had a great year in 2014, and I'm pleased to share with you all that we have done. What follows below is a comprehensive overview of the full range of activities undertaken by OCULA in 2014.

We have 635 OCULA Members as of December 31, 2014.

Strategic Initiative: Growing Career Paths and Potential

Our goal for this initiative is that our members look first to OCULA for progressive, thought-provoking, and practical professional development that expands their thinking, their capabilities, and their career opportunities. OCULA continues to focus on providing professional development to our members, and all of our events were received very positively by participants.

OCULA Spring Conference (held April 25, 2014)

The Spring Conference was held at the Inn on the Twenty in lovely Jordan Station. The conference theme was "Celebrate the letter M: marketing, mobile, and more." There were 51 registrants, 43 of whom were from the academic sector. The keynote speaker was Melissa Ramos, owner of Sexy Food Therapy Inc., and she provided insights into social media marketing. Rhonda Roth and Lynne Serviss, two of our

members-at-large, organized the successful event, and we would like to thank them for all of their hard work.

OCULA Spring Dinner (held May 15, 2014)

Hosted at the C'est What Brew Pub in downtown Toronto, the OCULA Spring Dinner featured Kevin Bryan, Professor for Public Safety and Police Studies at Seneca College. Kevin enlightened the audience on the many secrets of the forensics world and shared his experience investigating high-profile cases. The event was sold out with 32 people attending. We would like to thank Meg Ecclestone, Shanna Pearson, Adele Magowan, and Cynthia McKeich for their great work organizing this event.

OCULA Fall Event (held October 20, 2014)

The focus of the Fall Event this year was "From information gatekeepers to information designers: communicating and designing information to enhance the learner's experience." The keynote speakers were Devon Mordell, an instructional designer from McMaster University, and Tara Ogaick, an industrial designer from Carleton University, and 44 participants attended. We would like to thank Shanna Pearson, Mindy Thuna, Jeannie An, and Martha Attridge-Buften for all their hard work.

New Librarian Residency Award (NLRA)

The New Librarian Residency Award was created to provide entry-level professional work experience in an academic or research library to a new librarian. This award has been presented to five institutions since 2009. OCULA awards \$20,000 toward the funding of this position to the successful academic library, and the host institution funds the remainder of the librarian's salary. Humber College was the successful institution for 2014, and they hired Caleb Domsy to be a Digital

Learning Librarian. Caleb has already completed many projects for the library, including presenting at the eLearning Symposium, creating a series of instructional videos, collections work, and orientations and teaching for the Business School. Our thanks go to Kristin Hoffmann, Courtney Lundrigan, Kathy Ball, and Paulina Rousseau for their coordination of the institution proposals.

In order to continue supporting the NLRA, OCULA will be seeking charitable donations from the community, as it is not sustainable long-term for OLA to fund this \$20,000 award. We have formed a Fundraising Committee to focus on this initiative and to develop a strategy for our fundraising efforts. An advertisement about the NLRA has been sent to “Ex Libris” and will appear in the Spring issue. A draft prospectus has been put together to outline donation levels for the NLRA. Our thanks to Courtney Lundrigan, Denise Smith, and Sharon Munro for their continued efforts to fund the Award.

OCULA Student Award (aka Lightning Strikes Session)

There have been amazing sessions submitted for the OCULA Student Award, and the winner will be announced at the OCULA Awards Reception following the OCULA AGM. Our thanks to Shanna Pearson and Jeannie An for coordinating the submissions.

OCULA Award for Lifetime Achievement

The Award for Lifetime Achievement is being given to Jim Brett, User Services Librarian at the University of Guelph. He is recognized for his outstanding contributions to mentoring, OLA, and OCULA. Our thanks to Kristin Hoffmann for chairing the Awards Committee.

InsideOCULA

Information Briefs

Information briefs are two-page backgrounders on issues relevant to Ontario's college and university library staff. Each brief addresses an issue in terms of who, what, when, where, why, and how, focusing on the benefits and challenges, as well as the implications for libraries in higher education. Practicum student from the University of Toronto's iSchool

A new initiative this year was to partner with a MLIS program and/or Library Technician program to host a practicum student. We decided to begin with the iSchool at the University of Toronto, as they have an established practicum placement course.

We submitted a proposal and Kathryn Stickle has chosen to work with us for her practicum placement. Welcome Kathryn, and we're looking forward to working with you!

Strategic Initiative: Collaborating to Extend Libraries Strategic Voice

Our goal is to contribute to the view that libraries are essential contributors to the economy, education, lifestyle, and culture of a community. Our ultimate goal is to be an influential voice for libraries and the information sector.

Library Day at Queen's Park (November 26, 2014)

One of our key initiatives this year was participation in the Library Day at Queen's Park. OLA contracted with Impact Public Affairs, a public relations firm, and 25 library sector representatives met with MPPs and other key decision makers. A message kit was developed and the theme for the day was the positive impact that libraries have on people, communities, and Ontario. Shanna Pearson and I attended on behalf of OCULA. We spoke with three MPPs and attended Question Period. The MPPs were engaged and interested in what we had to say, and the plan is for this to become an annual day of advocacy for OLA and the divisions to engage in.

Strategic Voice Committee

We have created a new committee in order to coordinate OCULA response to various advocacy issues that arise or that are submitted by members.

Key Questions for Candidates

The College and University Libraries' section for the OLA's "Key Questions for Candidates" web page was updated for the Provincial election.

Our goal is that OCULA/OLA has the near-term and long-term strengths in terms of people, finances, and infrastructure to fulfill our mission and realize our vision.

OCULA Super Conference Report

Since the theme of OLA Superconference 2015 was “Think It, Do It,” OCULA Council recommended looking for sessions related to the following topics: collaborative projects, advocacy, AODA implications, the future of learning and information/digital literacies, entrepreneurial thinking, scholarly communications, human resources and mentoring, collections and collections management, space design, and user experience.

Several excellent ideas for a Spotlight Speaker were proposed by the OCULA Council and Superconference Planners. We were thrilled that our top choice, Barbara Fister of Gustavus Adolphus College in Minnesota, agreed to be our Spotlight Speaker. Fister is well-known for her innovative ideas about library instruction and how information works. She is also a strong advocate for the transformative power of libraries. Her talk, “Creating a “Let’s Do It” Organizational Structure” is sure to be an inspiration to delegates.

A new conference format has been adopted for Superconference 2015. This allowed planners to accept more sessions than in previous years. Thirty-eight OCULA sessions appeared in the final program, including the usual Lightning Strikes student award session and the Spotlight Speaker. Sixty-two excellent session proposals were received from the Call for Proposals and several unselected sessions were forwarded to the Poster Committee and to other streams in the interest of including as many participants as possible.
