6. President's Message / Annual Report for OCULA (Denise Smith)

President Denise Smith thanked Council for their dedicated service to OCULA with special acknowledgment to OCULA Past President Shanna Pearson and then delivered the following report ([full 2016 OCULA AGM report](#)):

Strategic Initiative: Building Career Paths & Potential: **OCULA Spring Conference (April 29, 2016)**

Our spring event was held on April 29th in Jordan Ontario. This year's theme focused on making space: in our physical libraries, creating digital space and also mental space. The conference hosted 48 delegates this year. Our keynote speaker, Jutta Treviranus, came to us from the Inclusive Design Research Centre at OCAD University. She spoke to us about digital inclusion, access for all to knowledge in our digital society and the role libraries play in mitigating the disparities that presently exist. Conference delegates were also tasked with the challenge of building the "Library of Spectacular Spaces" to create a digitally augmented library space. This small group activity produced a lot of fun, interesting, and creative ideas. The day also featured 10 Lightning Talks, a presentation from the OLITA lending library and an opportunity

for delegates to share how they create some much needed mental space with “The Little Box of Calm,” followed by an exploration of guided meditation.

I would like to thank Jack Young, Fiona Inglis, and our New Librarian Resident Chris Landry for organizing and hosting a fun, inspiring, and creative event.

OCULA Spring Dinner (May 19, 2016)

The annual OCULA Spring Dinner was held on May 19 in the Library Room at Hot House Restaurant and Bar. It hosted 23 guests. This year’s theme was “Open Access, Open Minds.”

The event we encouraged a community of sharing using Pinterest by asking libraries and librarians to share how they celebrate and advocate for Open Access (OA) week. We collected OA ideas in the form of a Pinterest Board that everyone can access, to help the community brainstorm ideas for future Open Access Week events. During the first part of the dinner, attendees mingled and viewed a slideshow of postings from the Pinterest board. The evening featured a special presentation by the Open Robarts team. Nelly Cancilla and Bobby Glushko from the University of Toronto’s Scholarly Communications Office discussed how their Open Robarts library used an alternate reality game to promote Open Access

Week. The evening also invited discussion about how Ontario's college and university libraries celebrate Open Access Week and their response to the changing landscape of Open Access. Thank you to Sarah Shujah, Andrew Colgoni, and Chris Landry for another successful spring dinner.

OCULA Fall Event (November 23, 2016)

The 2016 OCULA Fall Event took place online, in collaboration with OLITA, via Adobe Connect on November 23, 2016 and was well attended with 53 participants. The conference theme was, "The Next Transformation: Libraries and the Future of Higher Education" which included two speakers and a collaborative activity. Our opening speaker, Dr. Alec Couros from the University of Regina spoke to us about how he perceives academic libraries as an edtech professional. Our closing speaker, Louise McGillis from Memorial University, addressed the ongoing conversation about the future of academic libraries, whether or not we've been effective in doing anything about our concerns, and just how much has actually changed since this conversation began trending 10 years ago. Chris worked on a lot of exciting projects during his contract at OCADU, including: organizing Open Access Week events, drafting policies for OCAD's institutional repository, including a non-exclusive license agreement for deposits, and developing user guides for faculty members on how to deposit items into OCAD's digital repository. I am pleased to report that Chris still holds his position at OCAD U.

The OCULA NLRA Fundraising Committee has been hard at work this year with the goal to fund the award independently. I

am pleased to report that today we officially launch the New Librarian Residency Award Fundraising Campaign. With your support, we are going to crowdsource this valuable award that has proven to be critical in kickstarting six new librarians' careers since 2009.

In an effort to optimize our chances of successfully meeting our goal to raise \$10,000 by next year's SuperConference, the New Librarian Residency award will be offered again in 2018. Based on our success this year, council will consider the option of whether to make the award an annual or bi-annual offering from OCULA.
