In 2018, the Best Bets Committee underwent some unanticipated changes in membership due to movement in careers and personal circumstances mid-season. A call was placed for new members and we were able to add two new members to the 2018 committee: Lyndsay Irvine from East Gwillimbury Public Library, and Julia Campbell from Whitby Public Library. We continue to accept applications at this time.

Despite losing members part-way through the season, the committee was still able to read and evaluate approximately 400 titles, which has been this committee's annual average over the past few years. The committee will be meeting on January 10, 2019 to finalize the Top Ten Best Bets of 2018. The awarded titles will have their authors/illustrators and publishers notified, and the list will be made officially announced at the 2019 Super Conference.

In 2018 we moved to a new model of presenting our Best Bets at Super Conference – "Book Tasting with the Best Bets". This format allowed for more interaction between participants and created better flow and choice for the audience to learn about titles specific to the demographic they are interested in. The format was highly successful and is being continued at the 2019 Super Conference.

Best Bets once more participated in the 2018 Festival of Trees in Toronto and will be present at the 2019 Festival. As in previous years, we received a good response from participants, both students and teachers alike at this past year's Festival. As result of the unanticipated membership changes, the committee did not participate as actively with the other OPLA committees as initially planned for this season and was unable to attend the 2018 Child and Youth Expo. That said, Best Bets is in discussion with the Readers Advisory Committee to create another joint webinar to offer through the Education Institute in 2019.

At events such as Super Conference, Festival of Trees, and the Child and Youth Expo, the Best Bets committee shares our Top Ten lists – current and past years' – and highlight Canadian materials that are selected based solely upon their own merit for their intended audience. As the committee accepts all titles based on the eligibility criteria that they are written and/or illustrated by a Canadian and published in the given year, there are minimal barriers for small publishing house or independent publishers from having their title considered and recognized. These lists continue to be valuable resources for teachers, parents, and library staff as readers' advisory and collection development tools.

The committee vetted the questions and updated them for this years Children and Teen Survey. The survey questions were disseminated to all of Ontario libraries and the information was received back to form the basis of the survey.

The survey information was analyzed by Sarah Roberts of OLA and put into a written format. Amanda Wilks and Cameron Ray reviewed and edited the document and helped to form it for printing and online distribution.

For the first time the survey was launched at the Child and Youth Expo and Cameron presented on the highlights and major changes contained within.

The committee lost 3 members including co-chair Amanda Wilk. Jordan Graham has stepped in as Co-Chair for 2019 alongside Cameron Ray.

The committee is prepping itself for finding 3 new members as well as a major overhaul of the survey questions in order to get a larger number of libraries to involved themselves in the survey so that it can be an even better advocacy tool.
