





Five Little Indians Voted as the 2021 Forest of Reading® Evergreen Award™ Winner

Readers across Ontario vote for the best Canadian fiction and non-fiction

TORONTO, ON (October 18, 2021) – After months of reading the best in Canadian fiction and nonfiction for adults, readers from over 85 Ontario libraries have chosen Michelle Good's *Five Little Indians* (HarperCollins Publishers Ltd) as this year's Evergreen Award winner.

"Michelle Good's novel, *Five Little Indians*, illustrates how fiction can help us cultivate empathy, arrive at understanding, and seek truth. This story helps us understand the deep and real harms committed by the Canadian residential school system, and the ongoing impacts of those harms on Indigenous people today," says Erin Kernohan-Berning, chair, Evergreen Award Committee. "That *Five Little Indians* has been voted this year's Evergreen Award winner by readers demonstrates that Indigenous stories are important, and I hope that readers continue to learn from and elevate these stories. I am pleased to welcome Michelle Good to the list of Evergreen Award-winning authors."

The Evergreen Award program is designed for adults, comprised of the best titles in Canadian fiction and non-fiction, and run through book clubs, public libraries, and other community forums. It is one of ten programs that form the Forest of Reading, Canada's largest recreational reading program of its kind. A committee of library professionals chooses the nominated titles that are announced every January. Votes are tallied for the award in the month of September.

About Five Little Indians: Taken from their families when they are very small and sent to a remote, church-run residential school, Kenny, Lucy, Clara, Howie and Maisie are barely out of childhood when they are finally released after years of detention. Alone and without any skills, support or families, the teens find their way to the seedy and foreign world of Downtown Eastside Vancouver, where they cling together, striving to find a place of safety and belonging in a world that doesn't want them. The paths of the five friends cross and crisscross over the decades as they struggle to overcome, or at least forget, the trauma they endured during their years at the Mission. With compassion and insight, *Five Little Indians* chronicles the desperate quest of these residential school survivors to come to terms with their past and, ultimately, find a way forward.
