As the days get shorter and darker, I hope that everyone can stay cozy and relaxed as





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Survey Results – Benchmarking Ontario Public Libraries on the Climate Crisis

In the Spring of 2023, OLA's Climate Action Committee created its first climate benchmarking survey. As the survey was the first of its kind in Ontario, we hoped it would capture the current climate affecting the library landscape, and how libraries were responding to these challenges. It is our hope that this survey will shed light on those challenges, provide a road map forward, and celebrate the work already being done.

In 2023, 47 Ontario public libraries shared how they are experiencing the climate crisis. Here are the highlights of what we learned.

Key Findings

Board Support

68% report they have board support for climate or environmental initiatives.28% said their board has not yet discussed climate.

Policies to Support Library Staff

Just **55%** report having an official Continuity of Service **plan for emergencies**/natural disasters.

• Libraries as Evacuation Centres

47% said their library is an official **cooling/warming station**.

9% said their library is a designated natural disaster evacuation centre.

The Coulson Family Bracebridge Library: A New Chapter in Muskoka

On October 8, 2024, the Coulson Family Bracebridge Library proudly opened its doors to an enthusiastic crowd lined up outside, welcoming over 3,000 visitors on its first day alone. Nestled inside the Muskoka Lumber Community Centre, this new 23,000 sq. ft. facility is nearly triple the size of the former Carnegie building, providing the Bracebridge community with a space that is truly *anything but ordinary*.

The expanded library boasts innovative features, including a makerspace equipped with multiple 3D printers, a laser cutter, hand tools, robotics, a professional-grade recording studio for creators, and a dedicated local history room to celebrate the region's rich heritage. With multiple meeting rooms and public event spaces available, the library has quickly become a vibrant community hub.

The grand opening celebration featured activities for all ages, including a children's scavenger hunt, an expanded youth area for craft sessions, interactive story times and a live concert by Cam Galloway. Tours of the welcoming, modern space allowed patrons to explore the exciting new amenities, leaving them eager to engage in the library's future offerings.

CEO and Chief Librarian, Crystal Bergstrome, credited the tireless efforts of staff in preparing for this momentous day. "The journey to get to this point has been a lot of work, but seeing the joy and excitement on the faces of our patrons made it all worthwhile," she said.

More than just a new building, the Coulson Family Bracebridge Library embodies the spirit of innovation and community -- ensuring that it will continue to be a place where imagination and learning thrive.

Community Foundation Grant extends London Public Library/CMHA Partnership

Since 2022, London Public Library (LPL) has partnered with CMHA Thames Valley Addiction and Mental Health Services (CMHATV) to provide a qualified Transitional Case Manager (TCM) at its Central Library. What began as an 18-month pilot program has proven to be incredibly valuable, offering essential support to individuals dealing with mental health challenges, addiction issues, and homelessness. We are thrilled to announce that thanks to a generous \$280,000 Community Vitality Grant from the London Community Foundation, LPL can continue to offer these crucial services through 2027.

The TCM program provides a range of support services, including referrals for housing, legal assistance, and mental health counseling. Each month, the TCMs engage with potential clients at the Library, offering a range of crucial help and resources, from helping individuals fill out online forms to providing crisis intervention, all while focusing on understanding each person's unique needs.

The Community Vitality Grant ensures that London Public Library can continue to support individuals visiting the library who need these services.

Celebrate & Connect: Ontario Public Library Week 2024 at North Perth Public Library

The North Perth Public Library (NPPL) hosted week-long events across its three branches to recognize Ontario Public Library Week. Celebrations included:

- A photo area equipped with a balloon arch and biodegradable confetti,
- A visit from Pete the Cat,
- The launch of NPPL's new library cards,
- Gift basket draws (with library-branded mugs!),
- Library swag giveaways (buttons, colour changing pencils, temporary tattoos),
- A Friends of the Library table featuring the Dolly Parton Imagination Library,
- A storywalk around the perimeter of the Listowel Branch, showcasing a local author's work.

Oshawa Public Library's Annual Haunted House Was Frightfully Fabulous!

Just in time for the spooky season, Oshawa Public Library (OPL)'s Teen Advisory Group (TAG) transformed the McLaughlin Branch auditorium into a horrifying haunted lab.

Each year, TAG members, possessing the flair-to-scare, select a frightening theme and bring it to life as a fun, interactive exhibit which is open to the public. This year, they scared us with science.

The public's response was overwhelming, with a record-breaking number of people visiting the annual Haunted House event, eager for eerie experiments, ghastly demonstrations and spine-chilling surprises. Varying levels of spookiness were available upon request, resulting in many laughs and more than a few screams of delight (and just the right amount of fright!).

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Digitization of Perth County Newspapers

Stratford-Perth Archives has created a new way for the public to access historic newspapers from Perth County. One can now browse over 8,000 issues of 17 different publications in a free digitized newspaper database, making these rich sources of local history information keyword searchable and fully accessible.

Pre-1950 issues scanned so far are available for online access via the <u>OurDigitalWorld</u> website, a discovery portal that brings together content from archives and libraries across the province. Post-1949 issues scanned so far are available to browse and search in the same manner on public computers in the Archives' reading room. Not all Perth County newspapers at the Archives have, however, been digitized, but new publications and issues will be added to the database each year.

- Stratford Examiner, 1860; 1863.
- Stratford Mirror, 1923-1946.
- Stratford Times, 1876-1891.
- Stratford Weekly Herald, 1882.

More current issues of the Listowel Banner, Mitchell Advocate, Mitchell Times, Stratford Beacon Herald, Stratford Gazette and Stratford Times are available as well, but only on public computers in the Archives' reading room.

Stratford-Perth Archives is grateful to the Perth County Branch of Ontario Ancestors for their generous contribution to this project. The Archives would also like to thank its summer students for their diligent work digitizing and uploading newspapers over the last three summers. The scanning project will continue, and more issues and titles will be added to the database each year.

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Stratford Public Library's "Reader's Retreats"

In 2023, Stratford Public Library (SPL) began a series called the Reader's Retreat. It runs twice annually, focusing on readers' advisory (RA) and on relationship-building with patrons. Staff set up a cozy area off the main floor, with comfortable seating and snacks, and encourage patrons to settle in for a 20-minute chat with a librarian about their reading. Each patron leaves with a list of at least five titles to follow up on, either noted on a branded bookmark or emailed to them.

Each Reader's Retreat has a different theme, allowing the program to be marketed in a fresh way each time, and focus on different areas of reading. From Stretch Reads to Bibliotherapy, staff have had fun with it! Patrons have been going directly from their chats with staff to the stacks, with some returning for more RA help during regular hours. These are fun events for staff and patrons alike and have been showing very promising results!

Makerspace Opening Soon at Timmins Public Library

Local youth in the Timmins area will soon be able to enjoy a new free space for creativity, learning, and connection, thanks to the upcoming VIDMAR Makerspace at the Timmins Public Library (TPL).

Set to launch in January 2025, this newly renovated space will accommodate small group sessions and one-on-one programs geared to older teens and young adults. The makerspace will include new and exciting technology, including a 3D printer, sewing and Cricut machines, robotics equipment, a podcasting station, specialized software such as Adobe Creative Suite, with more to come as the space develops.

The makerspace has been funded by the Government of Canada's Building Safer Communities Fund through the City of Timmins and by the Library's reserve funds. Former City of Timmins Engineering Department employee, Branimir "Branko" Vidmar

(1913-1992), designated funds from his estate to be allocated towards facilitating the construction of TPL's new library building in 2005. His donation also included a stamp and coin collection, which were, as per his wishes, sold by auction. The funds from that auction were used for the development of the makerspace project, with the room now being named in his honour.

The Timmins Public Library strives to be a dynamic community hub and is thrilled to soon be opening this makerspace, which will provide a welcoming environment where youth can unleash their creativity, develop new skills, and connect with like-minded peers as they discover the diverse range of equipment and technology available.
